LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

2016 was a remarkable year for The Inn Between. Determined clients, once facing the hardship of homelessness, are "Rising to Success" after finding a place with the affordability and support they needed. Stabilized housing empowered them to lay groundwork and cultivate skills for stability to take root. With time and guidance, they've grown and continue to thrive.

The cost of market rate housing increased by 14% in 2015 and the overall cost of living in Boulder County increased 11% making it even more difficult for low-income people to find and maintain housing. Despite that, 81% of program graduates improved their housing situation upon leaving, finding either permanently subsidized or market rate housing. In addition to housing, clients are reporting improved employment, motivation, and income. The Inn Between provides for a basic need - housing - which provides our residents with an opportunity to look towards the future and set long-term goals.

While a stable place to live is a first step to remove other barriers to stability, the Inn's Supportive Housing and Services Program imparts educational components that help advance earning potential and self-sufficiency. In 2016, The Inn Between launched a few key activities to enhance our effectiveness.

- 28 Life Skills trainings were offered using experts in the community and tailored to meet the needs of our current client population in areas such as Personal Finance Management, Post-Secondary Education Planning, Job Readiness and Resume Writing, and Tenant /Landlord Rights and Responsibilities.
- 23 households participated in a newly implemented matched savings program designed to help clients learn the benefit of saving and assist with future rental deposit accumulation. For every \$1 they save The Inn matches it with \$2; up to \$500.
- Five \$500 scholarships were awarded to current and former residents to help remove cost barriers and encourage continuing education and certifications.
- 2 additional computers, with internet access, were added in the Education Center to increase access for more students.
- All 5 of our high school seniors in the Student Incentive Program graduated and moved on to full-time work and/or continued education programs.
- The most influential and effective changes were the improvements made to our application screening and inprogram review processes. Our screening process was strengthened to to better identify applicants that possess the motivation required to successfully complete our program and build a more stable future. Once accepted, our revised review process ensures that residents are staying on track to meet their goals. As a result, we have seen improved housing stability after clients complete our program.

These achievements are a testament to the strength of our organization and effectiveness of our programs.

As a home grown nonprofit, The Inn Between has been "a place to call home" for some of the most vulnerable community members for nearly 25 years. We've accomplished this cost effectively. The Inn Between's collaborative Supportive Housing model provided housing and services to 278 individuals for a cost of \$3,288 per person. It is always our goal to prudently utilize the resources you provide as we strive to be an agent of change for clients and empower them to achieve stability.

I am honored that you have entrusted your resources to us. Your support is of great benefit to the individuals and families living at The Inn and our community at large. Thank you.

SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROGRAMS

PROGRAMS

OUR PROGRAMS



In partnership with our referring agencies, The Inn Between empowers our residents to lead sustainable and self-sufficient lives. Residents progress towards greater stability by following self-determined action plans, attending life skills trainings, and through partnership with a case manager.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

No less than 50 units to provide safe, affordable housing for individuals and families. Residents must live in the St. Vrain Valley and work full time. They can stay for up to 24 months and pay 1/3 of income for rent & utilities.

IN 2016 WE SERVED 278 INDIVIDUALS, INCLUDING 116 CHILDREN

STUDENT INCENTIVE PROGRAM

Up to 10 units for homeless St Vrain Valley students (age 16+). Students receive no-cost room and board as long as a full-time schedule is maintained and grades and attendance are in good standing.

IN 2016 ALL 5 OF OUR HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS GRADUATED

EMERGENCY HOUSING

4 units available to clients of H.O.P.E. and the OUR Center. The units are made available within 48 hours of an identified need.

IN 2016, 6 INDIVIDUALS SERVED; 4 MOVED INTO STABLE HOUSING

PERMANENT HOUSING

Up to 8 units to provide a permanent residence for the elderly and disabled. Residents pay 30% of adjusted fixed income for rent and utilities.

IN 2016, 8 RESIDENTS HAD ACCESS TO TRANSPORTATION AND LOCAL SERVICES



BILINGUAL CASE MANAGEMENT

Case Managers partner with each client to determine life components that need development in order to progress towards self-sufficiency and build stability. I'm very thankful. SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Encourages continuing education by offsetting cost barriers for educational advancement options including technical schools and accredited certification programs.

SAVINGS PROGRAM

The Inn offers a matched savings program (2:1 up to \$500) to foster planning skills, help stabilize clients upon move out and provide for a rental deposit.



COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The Inn provides services to a diverse population, including: single and two-parent families, domestic violence survivors, teen parents, individuals with physical and/or mental disabilities, the elderly and teen students unable to live at home.

To ensure a broad population has access to our program, The Inn offers services through collaborations with 14 referring agencies:

- Boulder County AIDS Project (BCAP) Boulder County Public Health Boulder Shelter for the Homeless City of Longmont Senior Services City of Longmont Children and Youth Resources Mental Health Partners Safe Shelter of St. Vrain Valley St. Vrain Valley School District
- Outreach United Resource (OUR) Center Samples Supports Emergency Family Assistance Association Homeless Outreach Providing Encouragement (HOPE) The Twentieth Judicial District of Colorado Integrated Treatment Court (ITC)

These agencies provide case management to referred clients, with the exception of the St. Vrain Valley School District whose referred teens are managed by Inn Case Managers.

RISING TO SUCCESS



In 2016 the Garcia's (a family of 6) graduated from The Inn Between program. During their time at The Inn, they took advantage of our Matched Savings Deposit Program. After two years, they had saved enough to be able to purchase a mobile home for their family.

We were thrilled to give them a check for the maximum amount of \$500 and to know if was for a permanent housing solution!

COLLABORATION

The Inn Between has been a great transition program for my clients. Often the "shelter life" can be stressful and very difficult, and I find that once people regain a private space of their own they sleep better, feel better, and quickly gain insight in to how to better handle their situation and work on continuing to improve it.
